ON-SITE EVALUATION CONFIRMS VALUE OF FOUNDATION EFFORTS

In August 2009, then Vice President, Mrs. Margaret Jacobs and Board member Dr. Betty Strickland, conducted an on-site evaluation to determine the effectiveness of the Foundation's efforts to assist the Christianenburg School. Their report clearly indicates that the learners, educators and staff are making excellent use of the books, materials, and facilities provided by the Foundation. The principal of the high school that the learners attend after graduation from Christianenburg confirmed that learners from Christianenburg were a bit more advanced than those from other primary schools. As a result of meetings with principals of three primary schools, the principal of the high school, and a group of more than 125 parents (male and female) of Christianenburg learners, the evaluators endorsed the Board of Directors' proposal to assist the other schools.

During the visit our evaluators noticed that the tiled floor in the principal's office needed to be replaced. Upon returning home they conducted a targeted fundraiser and had the tile replaced. They saw a need and acted!

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT CHRISTIANENBURG PRIMARY SCHOOL IN 2010

Enrollment Is Increasing

When Dr. Bettye Bouey-Yates led the first group of travelers to Christianenburg in 1998 there were 1,285 learners and only 23 educators. Today there are 1303 learners and 34 educators. The first priority at this Kwa Zulu, Natal, South Africa school continues to be improving the mathematics and reading competency of the learners. The educators indicate that since the beginning of the current school year, new measures have been implemented and the results have been impressive. We offer kudos to the hard working staff.

Sprucing Up The Environment

Much has been done to improve aesthetics and safety at Christianenburg. The library, a major accomplishment of the Foundation, has a new ceiling which greatly enhances its appearance. The school district frequently holds meetings of principals in this very attractive facility. A full-time gardener has greatly improved the appearance of the outdoors and a much-needed security guard helps to bring peace of mind to all.

Computer Center -- The Newest School Addition

Thanks to the financial support of the Divine Life Society (a Hindu philanthropic group in Kwa Zulu, Natal) and a \$9,565 donation made by one of the travelers who visited the school in 2009, the computer center building, begun in late August 2009, is now complete. The school is attempting to raise funds to construct work-stations and purchase chairs to accommodate 50 learners. Creation of a center has been a goal of the Foundation for several years. Mini-laptop computers have been provided by the Education Department and all educators have received basic computer literacy training at the University of Natal. You can imagine just how anxious the learners are to become computer literate.

SEVENTH GRADE REFLECTIONS

You guys rock. Never knew that reading could be so much fun. I have learnt so much, especially from the Wise Up to Science pages. Please be sure to keep on rocking.

Our school has a Noah Project which is for orphans and vulnerable kids. Noah is helping those who are not enough supported from their homes. Noah is giving them support by giving them food and counseling them in their problems e.g. Single parents who are not working, HIV/AIDS, and orphans. Sometimes these Learners are living with grandparents. I think Christianenburg, is a school that puts the needs first-they make us their number one priority,What a school,what a place of comfort- Christianenburg is a home for everyone.

FOUNDATION OUTREACH TO OTHER SCHOOLS

During the past year the Foundation has reached out to three other public primary schools that are in the same neighborhood as Christianenburg: Clermont, Clernaville, and Udumo. These three schools have received dictionaries for the first time. Each seventh-grade learner received a dictionary to take home. This is a valuable tool for the learners to accrue dictionary skills before entering high school. The personal ownership of books is out of reach for most South African children.

Public Schools in South Africa are faced with many obstacles as they struggle to provide an excellent education with less than sufficient resources. Most students do not have the required school fees, a majority of parents are unemployed, and a significant number of learners are orphans. Finally, many learners live a distance from school so attendance is hindered by scarce transportation to and from school.

As mentioned above the Foundation has reached out to three additional schools:

- Clermont Primary School received 100 dictionaries (70 for 7th graders and 30 for use inschool).
- Clernaville Primary School has a total enrollment of 938 learners with 22 educators. The school received 150 dictionaries (120 for learners and 30 for use in-school).
- **Udumo Primary School** has an enrollment of 992 learners and 28 educators. The school received 150 dictionaries (120 for learners and 30 for use in-school).

The Foundation outreach is in its initial stages. There are plans to expand the reach of our assistance to these schools.


